The Committee of 100 Leadership Transition

The Board of Directors of The Committee of 100 is pleased to announce that Jennifer Kmiec will become the Executive Director of the organization effective December 1st. Jennifer replaces Paul Morrill, who is retiring.

The transition to new leadership began two and a half years ago when Jennifer was recruited to serve as Associate Director and assumed responsibility for the organization's event planning, communications, and administration. "We are pleased to have had such a seamless succession," said The Committee of 100 President Ted Williams. "We're fortunate to have an Executive Director with Jennifer's abilities and extensive contacts in government, business and education. Her broad experience in technology-based economic development puts us in a strong position as we work to build Delaware's 21st Century economy."



Jennifer has worked in business development and marketing for biotech companies. She was a founding director and is immediate past chair of the Delaware BioScience Association. She is a former board member of the Technology Forum of Delaware and served as the first executive director of the Delaware Sustainable Chemistry Alliance (DESCA). Jennifer is the founder and president of Inspiring Women in STEM, LLC, which organizes conferences that provide programming in leadership, professional, and personal development for women in STEM careers. The events also provide support for organizations that encourage more girls to pursue degrees in science, technology, engineering and math.

Outgoing Executive Director Paul Morrill recalled that he first encountered Jennifer when she was just getting DESCA off the ground. "I was impressed by her professionalism and presence of mind dealing with all the start-up issues. She'll be a strong leader and that's good for both The Committee of 100 and for the State of Delaware," he said.

Jennifer earned a Bachelor of Science in Biology from Southern Illinois University, and a Master of Administration from the University of California at Davis.

Paul Morrill, who has served as Executive Director since 2010, will continue to advise the organization on legislative and regulatory issues through June of 2019.

Concerns Regarding Wilmington Ordinance 18-041

The Committee of 100 recently sent letters to members of the Wilmington City Council expressing concerns about proposed Ordinance 18-041 (An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 8 of the City Code to Require that Developers Who Receive Financial Assistance From the City of Wilmington on Residential Construction Projects Require Their Construction Contractors to Hire Workers From Class A Apprentice Programs). The stated intent of Ordinance 18-041 is to assist residents in Wilmington's lower income neighborhoods by creating additional good-paying jobs for them in construction and increasing access to skills training on the part of members of underrepresented communities.

We support those goals fully, but believe that the proposed Ordinance will not deliver what it promises. If enacted, it would instead result in fewer affordable houses being built in Wilmington, would hobble the Neighborhood Conservancy Land Bank, would disproportionately impact small developer/contractors, and would make it less likely that subcontractors will want to work in the City.

The business community, organized labor, non-profits, and government should all be working together to tackle the problem of job skills disparities, which is very real. Unfortunately, by mandating a fixed percentage of apprentices on every jobsite, the proposed Ordinance doesn't address the most serious problem while at the same time driving a wedge between union and non-union employers, large and small contractors, and seriously impacting the work of non-profit organizations that provide much of the affordable owner-occupied housing in the City.
